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INSTRUCTORS CORNER

If things in Florida are not bad enough with the major flooding and massive destruction of structures from Hurricane IAN, Florida firefighters are now dealing with an influx of Tesla's and other electric vehicles igniting due to corrosion of the batteries from the saturation of salt water in the battery holding areas. According to the Florida State Fire Marshall, there are a large amount of electric vehicle fires due to the effects of IAN creating a whole new challenge for firefighters. There is stored energy in the batteries of these vehicles, although the vehicle is submerged in water, it does NOT mean that the energy has dissipated. It is a recipe for a serious hazard when exposing the electric components with salt water.

As previously reported, electric vehicles require thousands of gallons of water to extinguish. It may take hours to extinguish and they can reignite days later as the batteries react to the effects of the decomposition. The state of Florida has 95000 registered electric vehicles, second only to California in the U.S. This has caused an incredible amount of electric vehicle incidents that firefighters are now dealing with in a whole new scale.



(PRESIDENTS NOTE) This is one of many articles pertaining to electric vehicle incidents that we will continue to share as we find solutions to deal with these challenges. We don't need a hurricane to cause problems with EV's, localized flooding conditions with EV's navigating through deep puddles and flooded underpasses can compromise the batteries. For now, it is recommended that these EV fires receive an initial response of TWO engine companies, one for attack and one for water supply. Once they are safe to remove, be sure to record the tow company and the location that the vehicle is being towed to. These vehicles should be stored in an open area or parking lot away from structures and other combustibles. Hopefully they are located close to a municipal hydrant or other continuous water supply. If needed, call for a public works front-end loader to overturn the vehicle for easier access to the undercarriage battery storage. Prepare for a long-duration incident to completely extinguish these fires. Finally, don't feel defeated at your crew's inability to extinguish an EV fire, these vehicles can reignite multiple times due to battery degradation.
