

MARCH MEETING:

The next meeting of MIFDI will be held on <u>Wednesday, March 23, 2016</u> hosted by the Norwood Fire Department courtesy of Chief Anthony Greeley. We will meet in the first floor training room of Norwood's Public Safety Building, 135 Nahatan St between Rt. 1 and Rt. 1A. We last met in Norwood for our October 2012 meeting.

The training presentation will be provided by Steve Pugsley, Training & Safety Coordinator for Amtrak. Mr. Pugsley will provide an overview of firefighter safety and awareness during incidents involving Amtrak trains as well as operating safely along the Amtrak railway. Each year we hear of accidents involving fatalities along the Amtrak corridor from South Station to Providence. It is important that we operate safely when called upon for accidents on the rails.





Page 5 <u>EMS Run</u> <u>Electronic Cigarette Fires & Explosions</u>

The e-cigarette, also called a personal vaporizer, or electronic nicotine delivery system, is a battery powered device that simulates tobacco smoking by producing a heated vapor resembling smoke. These devices have become very popular as an alternative to smoking with over 2.5 million Americana now using electronic cigarettes.

The devices have a heating element to vaporize solution which usually contains a mixture of propylene glycol (for flavor), vegetable glycerin (for vapor), nicotine and other flavorings. Automatic e-cigarettes activate the heating coil when the user takes a drag. Manual e-cigarettes have a switch that the user depresses to energize the heating element to make the heated vapor. Most manufactured devices have a built-in timeout feature to prevent overheating. Many have a locking feature to prevent the switch from being activated in a pocket or purse.



E-cigarettes are sometimes used to smoke hash oil or "honey oil" derived by separating the resins from marijuana. Separating this hash oil from marijuana is a hazardous process often done illegally in hotel rooms and homes. First responders should be aware of this practice and the associated hazards.

The health effects of the vapor and the danger of nicotine overdose by ingestion or contact with the "juice" are the subject of ongoing reviews by various agencies. The FDA recently proposed regulations for e-cigarettes which only address the health effects of inhaling the vapors and do not address consideration of the battery or electronics used in the devices. Underwriters Laboratories has developed standards that relate to lithium battery safety applied to products required for testing by a nationally recognized testing laboratory such as UL.

A number of recent fires have been attributed to e-cigarettes causing concern within the fire service. Media reports of 25 incidents in the US from 2009 to present were found during an internet search. This is not thought to be all-inclusive since it is likely that many incidents were not reported to the fire department and/or the media. Of the incidents reported, the findings were broken down to the following;

Twenty incidents occurred while the battery was being charged.

Two incidents occurred during use.

One incident occurred during transportation on a cargo aircraft. Two were undetermined.

There were no deaths thus far but ten injuries reported.

Several burn injuries were reported.

Two serious injuries occurred when the devices exploded in users' mouths.



An event involving e-cigarettes occurs suddenly and accompanied by a loud noise, flash of light, smoke, flames, and often vigorous ejection of the battery and other parts. Most of the incidents resulted in ignition of nearby contents such as carpets, drapes bedding, couches, or vehicle seats.

The largest percent of incidents reported occurred during charging. Many e-cigarettes have a USB port for connecting the device to a power adapter provided by the manufacturer. Not all USB ports are created equal and the voltage and current provided by USB ports can vary significantly. The use of such non-approved power adapters appears to be responsible for most of the incidents involving e-cigarettes. Plugging an e-cigarette into a USB port not supplied by the manufacturer may subject the battery to a higher current than is safe causing thermal runaway that results in an explosion or fire.

The electrolytes used in lithium-ion batteries are either flammable or combustible liquids. During the typical failure mode for these batteries, the electrolyte is heated to its boiling point causing the internal pressure in the battery to build to the point where the seal at the end of the battery will rupture.

In conclusion, e-cigarettes are increasing in sales and popularity. Those of us in the fire service and EMS must be aware of this device and the potential hazards associated with them.
