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### **APRIL MEETING:**

The 515th MIFDI meeting will be held **Wednesday**, **April 23**, **2008** at the campus of the "On Site Academy" at Windy Hill Farm, 219 Bragg Hill Road, Westminster, MA.

The presentation will be provided by the staff of the On Site Academy courtesy of Dr. Hayden Duggan. Their motto "Serving Those Who Serve", focuses on Critical Incident Stress Debriefing and where to turn to for help when your members face an unthinkable tragedy. It is important to know about the statewide network of professionals and who to call when your members need assistance. This is something that must be available for your department within 24 hours when a tragic event occurs. This presentation is essential for every public safety employee.

The On-Site Academy is a non-profit residential treatment and training center for critical incident stress management. They serve emergency service workers who are in distress. Their program is for all law enforcement, fire service, EMS, or other human service personnel who are themselves temporarily overwhelmed by the stress of their jobs, what they have seen, and what they have been through. It is one of only two residential treatment facilities of this kind in the world.

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

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## **RECALL OF MEETING #514**

The 514th meeting of MIFDI was held <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>March 26</u>, <u>2008</u> and was hosted by the Hudson Fire Department, 296 Cox St. courtesy of Chief John M. Blood. Our meeting was held in the first floor training room of Hudson's impressive new fire headquarters. We last met in Hudson in May 2005 shortly after the new station opened.

The training session was provided by MIFDI member Paul Antonellis on how to handle a Line of Duty Death. Paul is an Assistant Professor with Anna Maria College, and a retired Fire Chief with 20 years in the fire and EMS field.

Paul outlined the Principle Steps which should be followed in a Line of Duty Death, the impact a LODD has on the family and community as well as the Follow-Up & After Care Steps.

This was a very informative meeting and Paul has graciously allowed us to post his presentation on the MIFDI website so those who were not able to attend, may see and download the PowerPoint presentation from www.mifdi.org as well as the follow-up articles which are worth reading.

Due to the excused absence of President Roche, who was away on department business conducting the final review of Newton's new pumper in Appleton Wisconsin, Vice President Brian Belliveau conducted a brief business meeting following the training presentations. Treasurer McLeieer read the Treasurer's report and outlined the assets for the organization remain strong. Member John O'Donoghue spoke on some important elevator code updates including changes to accept the larger 83" EMS stretcher inside elevators. Member Steve Persson provided a report on the Mass Fire Training Council meeting.

Members adjourned for lunch at nearby Piccadilly Pub Restaurant located on Route 85.



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## Influenza Season

The good news is that the "Influenza Season" is just about over. The bad news is that it has taken the lives of 4 children in Massachusetts. It is not uncommon for the flu to cause death among the elderly population or people with weakened immune systems, but for the flu to take the lives of otherwise healthy young children is troubling and unacceptable.

This past flu season has struck with great ferocity and has attributed to a large number of area hospitals to go on diversion, some for hours as a time. A finding reported that the vaccinations provided for this year's flu season were not adequate to fight off the virus and will hopefully be corrected for next year's flu season.

It is estimated that no more than two children die from flu in Massachusetts in a typical year. The flu threat presented to children has been underscored and it is now recommended that <u>all</u> children be vaccinated, except those younger than 6-months of age.

Parents must be aware of when to seek medical treatment for children without being over protective. Children with severe asthma, recurring heart condition, or other chronic illnesses should seek medical treatment if the develop flu symptoms. For an otherwise healthy child, the following guidelines are recommended: If a child has a fever but is still eating, drinking and out of bed, it is most likely safe to wait a few days before seeking medical treatment. If a child's fever ranges above 102 and is accompanied by lethargy, loss of appetite, cough, and chest pain, it is recommended that the child seek medical treatment sooner than later.

(Presidents Note: This is another reminder as First Responders we must always protect ourselves from exposures by practicing strict universal precautions. Gloves are a must on all EMS runs and don't forget to remove the gloves <u>before</u> getting back in the rig or behind the wheel of the ambulance. Encourage everyone to cough/sneeze into the bend of their arm as opposed to their hand. The use of an O2 NRB mask or N95 mask may be placed on the patient during transport. Clean the rig and equipment with bleach or alcohol based products after each call. And finally, you can never wash your hand enough, but don't wash up in the firehouse kitchen after runs!)

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## **INSTRUCTORS CORNER**

"Don't Be Me"

My name is Bob Kilduff. I have been a firefighter for 34 years. Were it not for some help above, marvelous medical people, and dumb luck, I would well be on my way to an early death due to occupational cancer. I am telling my story in the hope that another brother or sister firefighter will not have to share my experience.

Like many of you reading this, I only went to the doctor when it hurt. You know the drill; burns, cuts, smoke inhalation and the many orthopedic injuries that come part and parcel with our job. For reasons unknown, the thoughts of retirement age prompted me in May of 2003 to get my first physical exam in 30 years. I felt the best I had in years and the test results bore this out, all was well. The doc however advised that I have a colonoscopy due to my age. Not really thrilled, I acquiesced. The procedure was a piece of cake, however, the test revealed a large tumor in my colon which needed to be addressed. Twenty days later a section of my colon was removed. I had to undergo a 6-month chemotherapy program which could have been avoided with early detection. It now appears that my cancer is in remission and the doctors predict these procedures will help save my life.

The issue here is why go to the doctor and learn you're very sick when you can go to the doctor and keep from getting very sick? I have learned the hard way that you must act prudently if you want to see your grandkids grow, have a chance to retire, golf, fish, hunt, go to the track, or whatever. If you don't have regular medical check-ups, your odds of enjoying a longer than normal life are greatly diminished. <u>Early detection of cancer is paramount in successful treatment</u>. This will allow you to do what you want to do and not what your doctor will allow you to do.

In 1990, a cancer presumption law was passed by the Legislature in Massachusetts. The reason it was signed into law was that it has been shown that firefighters have a serious problem with cancer. Numerous studies have pointed to the fact that there are over a dozen cancers that attack firefighters more often than the general population. Our exposure to the products of combustion and the resultant carcinogens are the reason and we must be more proactive in protecting ourselves through cancer screening. Boston Fire Department Medical Examiner Mike Hamrock deals with cancer and firefighters daily. From his observations, firefighter cancer screening should take place if there is a family history of cancer. For example, colon screening normally scheduled for a 50-year-old should take place at age 40 due to our higher incidence of the disease. Firefighter deaths due to occupational diseases are far more common than the number of line-of-duty deaths caused by other means and we must take them seriously.

I ask that you take a few minutes to examine your efforts to help yourself stay healthy. Think for a moment about my experience over the last 10-months and if necessary, take the action necessary to help you avoid my fate. Remember, DON'T BE ME. God Bless and stay safe.
