RECALL OF MEETING #498

The 498th meeting of MIFDI was held on September 27, 2006 hosted by the Marlborough Fire Department courtesy of Chief David Adams.

The training session was provided by Ms. Jane McCluskey and Mr. Brian Rooney of Jones and Bartlett Publishers (www.jbpub.com). J & B is a leader among publishers of fire service and EMS publications. The presentation by Jane and Brian allowed our members an overview of the vast amount of publications in both text and electronic form for use during training and continued education as well as for promotional study. Catalogs were provided for those in attendance with a few additional copies at future meetings for those members unable to attend.

The presentation concluded with a brief business meeting held by President Roche. Two new members were introduced. Members approved funding for Treasurer Michael Mcleieer to attend the 2007 FDIC as representative of MIFDI. Training Council member Persson gave an updated report from the Massachusetts Fire Training Council meeting. The meeting adjourned for an enjoyable lunch at nearby Kennedy's Restaurant

E.M.S. RUN

Oxygen Regulator Fires

(FDA & NIOSH Public Health Notification)

FDA has received 12 reports in which regulators used with oxygen cylinders have burned or exploded, in some cases injuring personnel. Some of these incidents occurred during emergency medical use or during routine equipment checks. FDA and NIOSH believe that improper use of gaskets/washers in these regulators was a major factor in both the ignition and severity of the fires, although there are likely to be other contributing factors.

Two types of washers referred as CGA 870 seals are commonly used to create the seal at the cylinder valve / regulator interface. The type recommended by many regulator manufacturers is a metal-bound elastomeric sealing washer that is used for multiple use applications. The other common type, often supplied free of charge with refilled oxygen cylinders is a plastic (usually Nylon) crush gasket suitable for single use applications.

When used more than once, the Nylon crush gaskets require higher torque than the elastomeric sealing washers in order to seal the cylinder valve / regulator interface, and if they are used again, they require more torque with each successive use. The cylinder valve / regulator connection is designed to be hand-tightened. If the crush gaskets are re-used, the need for increased torque may require using a wrench or other hand tool, which can deform the crush gasket and damage the cylinder valve and regulator. This can result in leakage of oxygen past the cylinder valve seat across the nylon crush gasket. According to a forensic analysis supported by FDA and NIOSH, "flow friction" caused by this leakage of compressed oxygen across the surface of the crush gasket may produce enough thermal energy to spontaneously ignite the nylon gasket material.

FDA and NIOSH recommend that plastic crush gaskets <u>never</u> be reused, as they may require additional torque to obtain the necessary seal with each subsequent use. This can deform the gasket, increasing the likelihood that oxygen will leak around the seal and ignite. The following general safety precautions should also be taken to avoid explosions, tank ruptures and fires from oxygen regulators:

- Always crack cylinder valves (open the valve just enough to allow gas to escape for a very short time) before attaching regulators in order to expel foreign matter from the outlet port of the valve.
- Always follow the regulator manufacturer's instructions for attaching the regulator to an oxygen cylinder.
- Always use the sealing gasket specified by the regulator manufacturer.
- Always inspect the regulator and CGA 870 seal before attaching it to the valve to ensure that the
 regulator is equipped with only one clean, sealing type washer (reusable metal-bound rubber seal) or
 a new crush type gasket (single use, not reusable, typically Nylon) that is in good condition.
- Always be certain that the valve, regulator, and gasket are free from oil and grease. Oil or grease contamination is widely known to contribute to ignition in oxygen Systems.
- Tighten the T-handle firmly by hand, but do not use wrenches or other hand tools that may overtorque the handle.
- Open the post valve slowly. If gas escapes at the juncture of the regulator and valve, quickly close the
 valve. Verify the regulator is properly attached and the gasket is properly placed and in good
 condition. If you have any questions, contact your supplier.

LAST ALARM

25th Anniversary of the National Fallen Firefighters Memorial (Courtesy of the U.S. Fire Administration)

The 25th annual National Fallen Firefighters Memorial weekend was held October 7-8, 2006. A plaque with the names of <u>98</u> firefighters who died in the line of duty in 2005 was added to the National Fallen Firefighters Memorial located on the campus of the National Fire Academy. The names of six firefighters from previous years was also added. The plaques surrounding the Memorial, established in 1981, contains the names of more than 3000 firefighters.

Thirty-three states experienced line-of-duty deaths in 2005. Deaths resulted from various causes including; motor vehicle accidents while en-route to or returning from calls, training incidents, building collapses, being struck by objects (vehicles, trees) at incidents, falls, heart attacks, air tanker and helicopter crashes, electrocution, drowning, assault, and burns.

Four multiple fatality incidents accounted for ten deaths. Two multiple fatality incidents occurred at structural fires while the other two occurred during wildland operations. One structural incident involved an explosion, the other resulted in two firefighters becoming trapped. The wildland incidents involved aircraft crashes.

Wildland fires, controlled burns, and aircraft training/certification for wildland fire protection resulted in 10 deaths. Six of the firefighters died while piloting air tankers or helicopters.

Of the firefighters honored this year, 63 were volunteer firefighters, 37 were career firefighters, and 4 were contract firefighters.

New York had the Nation's largest number of line-of-duty firefighter deaths in 2005 with 17, while California, Pennsylvania, and Texas each had 8 firefighter line-of-duty deaths.

According to the Chairman of the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation Board of Directors, "the Foundation's services are offered to the families and colleagues of fallen firefighters not only following a line-of-duty death but for years to come."

INSTRUCTORS CORNER

Review of Elevator Operations for Firefighters

- Report to the designated elevator lobby (May not always be the 1st floor).
- Capture the elevators using the <u>3502</u> key.
- Turn the 3-position switch to the "ON" position and remove the key (Phase 1).
- You have now "captured" the elevator, all car and corridor call buttons shall be rendered inoperative.
- Enter the elevator, again using your <u>3502</u> key turn the 3-position switch inside the elevator to the "ON" position (Phase 2).
- The elevator is now operable ONLY by the members in the car.
- Remember that the opening and closing of the car doors in this
 phase can only be done by <u>applying continuous pressure</u> to the door
 open and door close buttons. If the button is released prior to the
 doors reaching the full open or full close positions, the doors will
 automatically reopen or reclose.
- Proceed to the desired floor (TWO floors below the fire floor).
- Leave one member in the elevator to control elevator operations.
- Once the crew has exited the car, the elevator should be returned to the lobby for further use by additional crews.
- Elevators should not be locked or held on upper floors by first due units, this denies other incoming units access to upper floors.
- As mentioned, Staging should be established TWO floors below the fire floor. The Staging area should consist of the following;
 - a) Staging Command
 - b) R.I.T. crew
 - c) Reserve team
 - d) Rehab area
 - e) Reserve equipment
 - f) SCBA changing area
 - g) EMS station
