

## **RECALL OF MEETING #549**

The 549<sup>th</sup> meeting of MIFDI was held on October 26, 2011 hosted by the Town of Watertown at the new Police Headquarters/9-1-1 Center located at 552 Main St. courtesy of Chief Mario Orangio of the Watertown Fire Department and Chief Edward Deveau of the Watertown Police Department.

The training was provided by Deputy Chief Gerard Mahoney of the Cambridge Fire Department. Deputy Mahoney gave a fascinating presentation on his informational trip to Israel in 2010 for a counter-terrorism seminar funded by the Anti-Defamation League. According to the ADL, Israeli authorities are uniquely equipped to discuss and share counter-terrorism strategies given the security situation in Israel and their experience in dealing with terrorist attacks against civilians.

Following the presentation, a brief business meeting was conducted by President Roche. Vice President Brian Belliveau spoke on the new radio system for the Fitchburg Fire Department, a project that Brian has been spearheading for the past few years. New member Captain Andy Connerty from Burlington was introduced. Guests included Operations Chief Jack Gelinas of the Cambridge Fire Department and Captain John Russo from the Watertown Fire Department. Chief Jim Vuona from Shrewsbury gave a briefing on the November meeting that he will host. President Roche spoke on a tragic incident in Newton where a worker was killed from a fall from a 1200' TV tower.

Members adjourned for lunch at John Brewer's Tavern & Restaurant in Waltham.

# Beat the clock when treating Heart Attacks

According to a recent study, hospitals are treating almost all heart attack victims within the recommended arrival time of 90 minutes or less.

Heart attacks are caused by clogged arteries that prevent enough oxygenated blood from reaching the heart. Each year, approximately 250,000 people in the United States suffer a major heart attach where a main artery is completely blocked.

The best remedy is "angioplasty" in which doctors push a tube through an artery to the blockage, inflate a tiny balloon to open it and then insert a mesh called a "stent" to keep the artery open.

Remember, reducing time to the O.R. is the key for patients to survive a heart attack with minimal heart muscle damage.

I know, you're thinking this is expensive and time consuming. After all, you need a PhD to do this stuff don't you? On the contrary. With today's technologically, the advent of advanced gas detectors, and the low cost of standard calibration gases, you can have the user doing the "bump" testing on a regular basis and keeping a log of the testing. When the "bump" test indicates a response of less than 90% of the target gas in the bottle, you simply proceed with calibration using the same bottle.

With the newer technology available today, all of this takes about 3-5 minutes. No kidding, it's that easy and you have given the user a lever of confidence which is not conveyed when you hand them a detector that already has a calibration sticker on it from a calibration they didn't perform.

So how critical is your air?

#### **INSTRUCTORS CORNER:**

How critical is your air? (John V. Carvalho III, Apollo Safety, Inc.)

Testing and calibrating your gas detectors before every use could mean the difference between life and death. Regular calibration schedules not only keep your sensors healthy and verified, it's the law.

Many gas detector users only want to hear what they want to hear, but those serious about the health and safety of themselves and those they are responsible for want the facts. The facts are that you don't know that your air is safe by simply turning the gas detector on and going straight to work. The sensors **must be tested.** Is this news to anyone? No it's not ... or at least it shouldn't be. All gas detector manufacturers clearly state in their operational and maintenance manuals that you must test the detector prior to each critical use.

#### How critical is your air?

Some manufacturers state that the period between calibrations can be as long as 6 months (not U.S. mfgs) in an effort to gain market share because they think it's what we want to hear, right? The standard questions go like this:

How often do I have to calibrate?

**Answer:** When "field" or "bump" testing indicates the sensors do not reach a high percentage of the "bump" gas value on the can, assuming the gas is within manufacturers "good by" date, then proceed with a full calibration.

How often must I "bump" test then?

**Answer:** before each critical use! If you do not use the meter for at least 4-weeks, you are best served by, at the very least, "bump" testing to verify that the sensors have not croaked, as oxygen sensors can do. You also need to make sure that some eager previous user looking to see if the combustible sensor respond, has not applied his disposable lighter to the LEL sensor and voila ... the LEL is either dead from over-ranging or has been poisoned. Poisoned by butane gas? That's correct. The LEL sensor is looking for the <a href="Lower explosive Levels">Lower explosive Levels</a> which are approximately in the 0-5% range, not 100% which is what comes out of that disposable lighter.

So how critical is your air and more importantly, how can you verify the safety and accuracy of your air? It's simple, make sure you "bump" test before each use and calibrate regularly, which by the way, will assist in keeping the sensors "healthy". Some sensors have a tendency to "go to sleep". Regular calibration schedules not only keep your sensors healthy and verified, it's the law.
