RECALL

The October meeting of MIFDI was held on Wednesday, October 27, 2021 hosted by the Massachusetts Department of Fire Services / Massachusetts Firefighting Academy – Stow Campus courtesy of State Fire Marshal Peter Ostroskey.

The training program was provided by MIFDI Treasurer Michael McLeieer with a recap and review of the 2021 FDIC Conference & Expo. Members in attendance were also provided with a thumb-drive which included some of the great presentations offered this year.

Signal for Help

The recent disappearance of Gabby Petito gained national news and has drawn attention to the dangers of domestic violence. According to the coroner, Gabby died from strangulation. Her homicide was suspected to be from her intimate partner during a cross-country trip. She is not the first to die from domestic violence and unfortunately won't be the last.

Since the pandemic, there has been a significant increase in violence with intimate partners and families due to the stress created during Covid. We as First Responders must be alert for signs of possible domestic violence between couples and be aware of the "red flags". The most obvious signs are; black eyes, bruises on the arms, busted lips, red or purple marks on the neck, and sprained wrists. You may see subtle cover ups like a neckerchief, long sleeves, sunglasses, or excessive makeup. Emotional signs include; agitation, anxiety, apprehension, low self-esteem, acting fearful, and depression. Some may even attempt suicide rather than live in a violent relationship with an abusive partner.

There is now a universal signal created to help combat the increase in domestic violence. This hand signal is performed by HOLDING ONE HAND UP WITH THE THUMP TUCKED INTO THE PALM, THEN FOLDING THE REMAINING FINGERS DOWNWARD.

INSTRUCTORS CORNER:

Replace Aging CO Alarms

As we enter the winter heating season, it is important to re-issue this C O reminder.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) alarms have been required in nearly every residence since March 2006. The life expectancy of carbon monoxide alarms is 5-7 years depending on the alarm manufacturer. Most CO alarms installed after the state's CO Law was passed have reached the end of their useful life and need to be replaced. No home appliance lasts forever.

The life of a CO alarm begins when it is first powered up. Most CO alarms have a date of manufacture stamped on them which can be used as a guide if the activation date was not recorded. One sign that a carbon monoxide alarm should be replaced is a chirping sound that does not stop until the unit is powered off. Another sign that a CO alarm should be replaced is that it makes a low battery signal even after new batteries are installed. Models with a digital readout will show an "ERR" or "EO9" or "END" message.

It is important to remind residents that their CO alarms may be reaching the end of their lifecycles and should be replaced BEFORE the beeps indicating end of life. This also provides continuous protection against possible CO poisoning and reduces the number of false alarms to local fire departments. Since Nichole's Law took effect in 2006 requiring CO alarms in every Massachusetts residence, many people have been saved from CO poisoning. CO alarms notified them that something was wrong at the earliest possible stages of CO detection.

(PRESIDENTS NOTE: When responding to an EMS call for a party not feeling well, dizziness, headache, weakness, confusion, vomiting, etc; have a member bring in the Multi-Gas Meter to ensure that they are not suffering from exposure to carbon monoxide)
